THE MOST MISUNDERSTOOD AND MISUSED VERSES FROM SCRIPTURE - Part VIII

Jeremiah 29:11 is often used as a favorite and life verse and has been the recipient of much commercial success: greeting cards, T-shirts, bumper stickers, etc.

Reference: **Jeremiah 29:11** "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the Lord, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope."

Most people use this verse as a subconscious expectation as to how they perceive God wants to bless them here and now. The thinking is that this verse guarantees that God has a fantastic futuristic plan to bless them with material possessions and good health and profitable personal relationships and never to permit hurt and harm to come to them. But that idea completely ignores the historical and textual context of this verse.

In order to understand a particular biblical passage we must learn the difference between textual interpretation and textual application.

Jeremiah prophesied that the southern kingdom of Judah would be judged (i.e. the Babylonian captivity or Babylonian exile). He then prophesied that after 70 years those captive Judeans would be released and permitted to return and re-establish Judah.
